Critical Perspectives on Energy Transitions in Africa

December 13-14, University of Ghana, Ghana

This conference is a showcase of research work conducted by the interdisciplinary fellow group (IFG) at Maria Sibylla Merian Institute for Advanced Studies in Africa (MIASA) at the University of Ghana which has focused on the broad theme of “The Governance of Energy Transitions in the Global South” from September to December 2020. The IFG’s work has been animated by the questions: What is meant by sustainable energy transitions in different Global South contexts? What are the multiple roles that different actors on the ground play to foster sustainable energy transitions? To what extent are local concerns about sustainable energy transitions reflected in international conceptualizations of sustainability and justice? The conference includes presentation by IFG research fellows, as well as keynote lectures and roundtable discussion being delivered by leading scholars and experts in the field of African energy transitions.

Keynote Speakers



Dr Elsie Onsongo (Leiden-Delft-Erasmus Universities)

Dr Onsongo holds a PhD from Friedrich Schiller University, and have previously worked as a postdoctoral researcher at the International Institute of Social Studies of Erasmus University Rotterdam, and has been a visiting research fellow at the Science Policy Research Unit, University of Sussex and has worked at Strathmore University in Kenya in various teaching, research and administrative capacities. She is currently establishing the Centre for Frugal Innovation in Africa (CFIA) Kenya Hub in Nairobi, on several small-scale projects on bottom-up frugal innovation in Kenya in energy access, health care, agro-food and water. She is also engaged in a UKRI GCRF-funded research project exploring the sustainability, inclusivity and governance of mini-grids in Africa. She is also working as a consultant affiliated with the University of Sussex in the Modern Energy Cooking Services programme—a DFID-funded project aimed at inducing a transition from the reliance on biomass for cooking to clean modern energy in sub-Saharan Africa.



Dr Festus Boamah (University of Bayreuth)

Dr. Festus Boamah obtained his Master’s and PhD degrees in Development Geography at the University of Bergen (Norway) and Bachelor’s Degree in Geography & Resource Development at the University of Ghana, Legon. Dr. Boamah’s earlier research focused on Livelihood Impacts of Biofuel ‘Land Grabbing’ in Ghana. His current post-doctoral research (Habilitation) at the University of Bayreuth focuses on Self-organization of Solar PV Electrification, Socio-Technical Systems and Energy Justice in Ghana and Kenya. The output of his academic research has appeared in *Geoforum*, *Annals of the Association of American Geographers*, *Development & Change*, *Review of African Political Economy*, *Energy Research & Social Science*, *Politics and Governance (PaG)*, and *Journal of International Development*. He has published book chapters in ZedBooks and Edward Elgar Publishing. He recently co-edited the PaG themed Issue *Politics and (Self-)Organisation of Electricity System Transitions in a Global North–South Perspective*.
