- 75 years of attracting significant funding for ground-breaking research addressing pertinent issues;
- 75 years of setting the pace for quality teaching and learning on the higher education landscape in Ghana and beyond;
- 75 years of nurturing great minds, shaping careers and building transformational leaders;
- In essence, it has been 75 years of dedicated service to the nation, positively impacting Ghana and the world at large.

The University has earned this enviable feat by dint of hard work on the part of principal and other officers of the university, faculty, administrators, other professionals, students and our alumni who are undoubtedly eminent and notable, and they continue to make the University proud in various facets of our economy. UG has produced Presidents and Vice-Presidents of this Republic, corporate giants, seasoned media and communication practitioners, legal luminaries, economic and finance experts, top-notch researchers and health workers, just to name a few.

From a humble beginning, UG has transformed from when it started out in 1948 on the Achimota Campus as the University College of the Gold Coast, to Legon campus, and its transformation to the University College of Ghana, until 1961 when UG became a fully-fledged university with the power to award its own degrees. Under my leadership as Vice-Chancellor, Management of the University is committed to leveraging on the solid foundation built by previous administrations. My vision as Vice-Chancellor, driven by the key concepts of technology and humanism is reflected in the theme for the 75th anniversary - *"Nurturing Resilience, Adopting Technology, Embracing Humanism"*

Profile of Mrs. Elsie Addo Awadzi

Mrs. Elsie Addo Awadzi has over 26 years of professional experience working in various capacities in Ghana and internationally in law, finance, policy and regulatory reforms, financial sector regulation, sustainable development, and public financial management, among others. She is the Second Deputy Governor of the Bank of Ghana, a position she has occupied since February 2018. She is the second woman to occupy the Office of Deputy Governor in the Bank of Ghana's 65-year history.

Under the leadership of Governor Ernest Addison, she has oversight of the Bank of Ghana's banking supervision, market conduct, and financial stability functions, among others. She is a member of the Bank's Board of Directors, a member of the Monetary Policy Committee, and a member of Ghana's Financial Stability Council which has representation from financial regulatory authorities in Ghana and the Finance Ministry.

As a staunch advocate for inclusive and sustainable finance, she chairs the Alliance for Financial Inclusion (AFI)'s Gender Inclusive Finance Committee which provides thought leadership and guidance to the 100-member AFI network on the design and implementation of measures to close the gender gap in access to finance in developing countries. She is also a member of the Expert Leaders Group on Women's Financial Inclusion in the Digital Economy established by the Graça Machel Trust.

Before her appointment as Deputy Governor, Elsie was Senior Counsel of the Financial and Fiscal Law Unit of the International Monetary Fund (IMF)'s Legal Department where she advised on public financial management reforms, financial sector reforms, and the design of crisis management arrangements for IMF member countries, among other things. Before joining the IMF in 2012, Elsie was a Commissioner of Ghana's Securities & Exchange Commission for six years. She also designed key financial sector reforms in Ghana and abroad, and worked extensively in private law practice, consulting, and banking, among others.

She holds an LL.M. degree (International Business and Economic Law) with distinction from the Georgetown University Law Center (2012), M.B.A. (Finance) and LL.B. Degrees from the University of Ghana (2000 and 1993 respectively), and a post-graduate qualifying certificate to practice law from the Ghana School of Law (1995).
